ACT ONE

Prologue

Lights up on Charlotte, standing on stage in a snowy white robe. Her makeup and hair are done up to project a sophisticated look.

CHARLOTTE. (Addressing the audience.) Before we begin, I'd like to explain a convention that we'll be using that will make the viewing of this play a bit more comfortable. I will be playing a sex worker. And although nudity on stage is nothing new and has been used extensively in many important and award-winning plays, the playwright feels that it takes too much work for you, the audience, to stay focused if there are exposed breasts and genitals competing with the dialogue. The playwright has attended such productions herself and will admit, for instance, that she remembers very little about the production of *Equus* except that the actors playing the leads were not natural blonds. Also, the playwright has written into the character description of Charlotte, yours truly, that she has large breasts due to implants. Therefore, if the actress playing the role had to expose her actual breasts it would severely limit the casting options. The fact is, most of the finest actresses on the American stage are small to medium bosomed, and the production team didn't want to deprive themselves of that talent pool. That said, we'll be portraying my nudity in this way: (Charlotte takes her robe off to reveal an anatomically correct naked suit with enormous breasts and a trimmed patch of pubic hair.) Please take a moment to acclimate yourself to this device. (Charlotte turns her body to allow everyone in the audience to get a good look. Mathew/Lewis, a young man in his 20s, enters. He's also wearing a robe.) The playwright has also written a part for a thirteen-year-old boy. But because of the adult subject matter of this play, we knew it would be problematic to cast a minor in this role. The actor you see before you is over twenty-one. (Mathew/Lewis shows us his driver's license.) This actor will also be doubling in the role of a male sex worker. (Mathew/Lewis takes off his robe. He's wearing an anatomically correct naked suit from the waist down that sports an enormous penis.) Please take another moment to acclimate yourself to this device. Or not. Perhaps you'd rather be aroused. There's nothing wrong with that. Go ahead. The theater is dark. No one will know. Thank you. Enjoy the show.

Scene 1

A gynecologist's examination table is wheeled in along with Charlotte's clothes, a silk blouse and designer suit, which are neatly hung next to a pair of expensive high heels and a briefcase.

Charlotte enters wearing a cotton examination gown in a cheerful pastel print. She takes a seat on the table and opens up a Forbes magazine to read while she waits for the doctor. There's a knock on the door, and Dr. Rhona Bloom comes in. She's middle-aged, personable — a solid citizen of New York's Upper West Side.

RHONA. Hello, I'm Dr. Bloom.

CHARLOTTE. (Extending her hand.) Hello, Dr. Bloom, I'm Charlotte. Nice to meet you.

RHONA. Nice to meet you, too.

CHARLOTTE. Thank you so much for seeing me. I know you don't have a lot of openings for new patients but you came so highly recommended, I had to try. Everyone says you're the best in your field.

RHONA. Oh, that's nice to know. Who referred you?
